The conference activities include farm visits to the Monamore Herd of Tom Kelly and the UCD Lyons research herd, a gala ball, the Emerald Expo show and much more. History of the EHRC

The EHRC was established in 1966 to improve, develop and promote the Holstein and Red Holstein breed by close co-operation of all officially recognised European Herdbooks. Prior to this European Herdbook Societies had no co-ordinated co-operation, each administering its herdbook according to its own rules. This led to very different breeding goals across the continent and difficulties in getting pedigree registrations recognised across member states.

The EHRC established the hugely successful European Show which has been postponed due to Covid. We look forward to being able to attend this great Conference in 2023 instead. The EHRC is hugely supportive of young breeders and published an extensive guide for young breeders on how to prepare, train and care for animals for showing.

The EHRC also operates European Judging conferences which form necessary training and appraisal for individuals wishing to join the prestigious European Holstein Judges Panel. The judges panel was formed to harmonise judging across Europe; standardising showring protocols, judges assessment and reason giving techniques. In Europe, Holstein judges are advised to consider four composite traits, namely Dairy Character (10%), Frame (25%), Feet & Legs (25%) and Mammary System (40%) in line with linear trait scoring that is carried out across the member states for classification of Holstein animals. In 2019 the European Holstein Judges Workshop was held in Ireland and we are very proud to have four Irish judges on the current panel; Paul Hannan, Garry Hurley, Victor Jackson and Gary Jones.

The Irish Holstein Friesian Association (IHFA) is a member owned organisation directed by the IHFA board which is directly elected from its 3,700 members in 15 club areas. The association is licensed by the Department Of Agriculture to issue ancestry and pedigree registration certificates. The IHFA is responsible for the validity and upkeep of the herdbook of Holstein Friesian cattle and for giving direction to the development and promotion of the breed in Ireland through its many events and services. The association offers a grade-up service, whereby commercial dairy cows can be graded to full pedigree in three simple steps.

IHFA aims are to improve the breeding of pedigree Holstein Friesian cattle by encouraging its members to adopt all scientific methods to enhance genetic gain and improve conformation standards suitable to twenty first century dairy production. IHFA aims to continue its open herdbook policy where new members are welcome to join and avail of its grade-up service, whereby

commercial dairy cows can be graded to full pedigree with registered traceability. This herdbook service expands the wide genetic diversity of the breed.
